ABOUT THE ARTIST

KATHY MATTEA

Hailed by *The Washington Post* as "one of Nashville's finest song interpreters," Kathy Mattea has enjoyed much success and acclaim during her 35-year career in country, bluegrass and folk music, including two Grammy wins, four CMA Awards, four No. 1 country singles, and five gold albums (plus a platinum greatest hits collection). Her latest album is *Pretty Bird*, produced by her old friend, roots music wizard Tim O'Brien. The wide-ranging collection of songs chronicles a period of rededication to singing, digging back in with a vocal coach and emerging with a poignant and eclectic CD. In addition to creating and recording music and performing live on tour, Kathy is increasingly involved with public broadcasting, consulting and contributing on screen in Ken Burns' 2019 documentary for PBS, *Country Music*, and recently replacing founder Larry Groce as the host of the long-running NPR show *Mountain Stage*. www.mattea.com

Born and raised in Havana, Cuba, Alfredo Rodriguez eventually made his way to the U.S. and embarked on a career as a Grammy nominated jazz pianist and composer. His music embodies the collective sound of his new home in Miami: a blend of Latin pop, salsa, bachata, tango, and bolero. The music demonstrates the unique way in which "his playing, proficient and soulful, projects a spirited, youthful charm" (New York Times).
